# CALVARY MATER RECEIVES FUNDING FOR SPECIALIST NURSE

In February 2022, the Melanoma institute Australia (MIA) and Melanoma Patients Australia (MPA) published a state of the nation report on melanoma in Australia. One key recommendation was to enhance diagnosis, treatment and care for melanoma patients by introducing and funding a National Melanoma Nurse Program.

The Australian Federal Government has committed \$14.8 million to support the initiative to be managed by the Melanoma Institute Australia.

The funding will allow for the equivalent of 35 full time nurses across the country, with a goal of improving clinical outcomes and overall wellbeing for melanoma patients through quality supportive care and education.

We are excited to advise that Calvary Mater Newcastle has secured funding from this initiative to employ a Specialist Melanoma Clinical Nurse Consultant with a Full Time Equivalent of 0.6 – ie three days per week. Working closely with oncologists,

surgeons and surgical nurses, this nurse will assist patients with complex treatment needs to ensure continuity of care and improved clinical outcomes.

By providing dedicated, specialised support, this initiative aims to improve the quality of life for melanoma patients and their families. With the continued support of the Australian Federal Government and the Melanoma Institute Australia we are taking a critical step forward in the fight against melanoma.

## HMF JOINS AMSCA TO DEVELOP A NATIONAL MELANOMA SCREENING PROGRAM

Melanoma is known as our national cancer in Australia. Why? Because we have the highest incidence per capita in the world. In fact, melanoma is the 3rd most diagnosed cancer in Australia. Among men, it is the second most common cancer after prostate cancer, and among women, it ranks third behind breast and bowel cancer.

When HMF was formed in the 1980's, Newcastle and the Hunter region had the highest melanoma rates in the country. Since then, we have been dedicated to reducing these rates by educating the community about melanoma prevention and early detection.

The most recent state wide data from the Cancer Institute of NSW reveals that, while we remain among the top 25 melanoma hot spots in the state, we are no longer at the top of the list. Currently, Port Stephens LGA ranks 12th, Lake Macquarie LGA is 15th, Maitland LGA is 20th, and Newcastle LGA is 24th.

However, figures released by the Hunter New England Local Health District in February this year indicate that melanoma remains the second most diagnosed cancer in the district, just behind prostate cancer. This highlights that we still have significant work ahead to achieve our mission of defeating melanoma in the Hunter Region.

Early detection plays a vital role in reducing the fatality rates of melanoma but often there are many challenges associated with this.

Our data from surveying community members who attend our free spot check clinics tells us that many people don't know where to get their skin checked, many find it unaffordable and others find accessibility and wait times to be an issue.

So if prostate, breast and bowel cancer all have national screening programs, why doesn't melanoma? Great question, and one we've been asking for some time.

HMF are very proud to be a part of the Australian Melanoma & Skin Cancer Alliance (AMSCA). This group comprises 12 Australian organisations that provide a sector-wide voice for the leading consumer, research, and clinical organisations working to improve outcomes for people affected by melanoma and skin cancer. Together, we strive to advocate for comprehensive screening programs and better support for those impacted by these conditions.

In May this year, representatives from AMSCA prepared a Consensus Statement, which was presented at a Parliamentary roundtable meeting organised by the Department of Health and Ageing.

The latest Federal Budget announcement included a \$10.3 million allocation to develop an evidence-based roadmap for a targeted national skin cancer screening program.

The funding has been allocated to the Melanoma Institute Australia (MIA), which will collaborate with Cancer Australia and the broader sector, including AMSCA members, to research and develop this evidence-based road map over the coming years.

Collectively, we recognise the immense challenge that melanoma and skin cancer pose in Australia. Our dedication to establishing a national screening program is driven by the need to reduce mortality rates and improve outcomes for those affected by skin cancer, ensuring a healthier future for all Australians.

## Impact Statement

Each financial year we take a look back at the work we have completed and measure the results to ensure we are achieving the goals we set in our Strategic Plan.

This year we have exceeded some of our targets as we continue to strive towards our goal of defeating melanoma.

**Spot Check:** We provided 4 days of free skin check clinics seeing 475 community members and finding 78 suspicious spots including 21 suspected melanomas. This takes our total over the last 5 years to 1692 skin checks, 317 suspicious spots and 79 suspected melanomas.

**Community Education Sessions:** We delivered 30 education sessions to the community including community groups, schools and the workplace.

**Community Events**: We attended 12 community events to raise awareness of HMF and melanoma.

**Patient Support:** We provided patient support including transport to treatment and our support group services to over 40 patients.

## HMF Support Group

The HMF support group meets every two months on the last Thursday of the month. This diverse group includes melanoma survivors, individuals currently undergoing treatment, and those who have lost loved ones to the disease, all coming from different walks of life.
